The Licensing Team are in receipt of 3 applications for the grant of Licensed Premises Gaming Machine Permits. Officers are delegated to approve up to 4 machines whilst requests for machines in excess of 4 is a function of the Licensing Committee.

REPORT

- 1. Schedule 13 of the Gambling Act 2005 considers Licensed Premises Gaming Machine Permits and allows Category C and D gaming machines to be installed in premises where a Premises Licence authorising "on sales" is in place under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2. A Category C machine has a maximum stake of 50p and a maximum prize of £100 whilst the minimum stake on a category D machine is 10p or 30p non-monetary with a maximum £5 cash prize or £8 non-monetary.
- 3. There is no statutory limit on the number of machines within the above categories that may be installed in the premises and at Fylde, Officers are delegated to determine requests of up to 4 machines whilst requests for any machines over 4 must be determined by the Licensing Committee.
- 4. The Licensing Team have recently received 3 requests to have 5 or more category C and D in licensed premises as detailed below:

- 5. As can be seen, the requests are for the installation of Category D machines. It is understood that following guidance issued by the Gambling Commission, a number of machines such as crane grabs that have previously been considered to be "skill with prizes" and thus outside the Gambling Act, have now been re-designated as category D non-complex crane grab machines and require registration.
- 6. The premises listed above have previously operated with crane grabs and the applications are submitted to ensure compliance with the revised Guidance.
- 7. The Committee is therefore requested to consider and determine the applications.

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and The Lancashire Safeguarding Children Board have recently commissioned Sigma Consultancy (Lytham) Ltd to deliver Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and Safeguarding Briefings to elected members.

The briefing will last no more than one hour and will cover CSE awareness and update members on the case picture within Fylde and provide further information regarding the work that is going on with taxi drivers in Lancashire.

The presentation will be delivered by Tony Baxter, a retired Detective Inspector with Lancashire Constabulary with 10 years' experience of investigating CSE offences, predominantly in Blackpool.

The importance of the role of licensing in safeguarding vulnerable children and adults has been highlighted by recent events in Rotherham, Rochdale and Oxford.
