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# LICENSING ACT 2003

# THE LICENSING ACT 2003 (HEARINGS) REGULATIONS 2005

# PROCEDURE FOR THE CONDUCT OF HEARINGS

## 1. Preliminary

- 1.1. Under the regulations, the Licensing Authority is required to determine the procedure that it proposes to follow at any hearing under the Act. This document sets out the procedure that Fylde will normally follow.
- 1.2. A panel may decide to follow a different procedure at any hearing. If it does, it will specifically draw attention to any departures from the procedures set out in this document and the reasons for them.
- 1.3. Please refer to the regulations for other rules about procedure

## 2. Interpretation

In this procedure, the following words or phrases have the following meanings:

applicant	an applicant for a licence or any person who has a licence which may be reviewed or revoked as a result of the hearing		
act	The Licensing Act 2003		
licence	Includes any consent or permission under the act		
panel	A sub-committee established by Fylde Borough

# 3. Before the hearing

- 3.1. At least ten days before the hearing, the panel will meet to consider:
  - 3.1.1. If the circumstances set out in regulation 9(1)apply, whether to dispense with holding a hearing;
  - 3.1.2. What, if any, particular points it considers it will want clarification on at the hearing from a party under regulation 7(1)(d), and
  - 3.1.3. What time limit to set under regulation 24.
- 3.2. If it is not practicable for the panel to meet to consider these matters, the convenor may ascertain the views of panel members separately and give effect to the majority view as if it had been reached in a meeting of the panel.

# 4. Opening the hearing

- 4.1. The convenor will identify all parties to the hearing who are present. The convenor will also identify any persons who are present who intend to assist or represent any party and any witnesses.
- 4.2. The legal officer will then explain to the parties the procedure to be followed at the hearing, specifically drawing attention to any departures from the procedures set out in this document and the reasons for them. The legal officer will also inform the parties that the proceedings will be recorded.
- 4.3. The panel will then consider any request by a party under regulation 8(2) for another person to appear at the hearing. The convenor will give any party who has made such a request (or their representative) which the panel proposes to deny an opportunity to address the panel about their request. The panel will then re-consider the request.
- 4.4. The convenor may invite any officer to carry out any functions under this paragraph.

## 5. Listening to the parties

- 5.1. Each of the parties will then be invited to:
  - 5.1.1. Open their case by addressing the panel;
  - 5.1.2. Give any further information requested by the panel under regulation 7(1)(d);
  - 5.1.3. Present the evidence of any witness; and
  - 5.1.4. Conclude their case by addressing the panel.
- 5.2. The order in which the parties will be invited to put their cases will be in the discretion of the panel, except that a party who is an applicant will be invited to put their case last.

## 6. Questioning the parties

- 6.1. Members of the panel may, following the conclusion of the case of each party, ask questions of that party or any witness appearing for them.
- 6.2. A party or their representative may only question another party if they have asked for permission from the panel after the panel members have finished questioning that party or their witness. The panel will only give permission if it is satisfied that the questioning will provide useful information about a matter relevant to their determination which is unlikely to be placed before the panel without such questioning

# 7. Time limits

Each party will be limited to the time set by the panel under regulation 24 in which to exercise their rights provided in paragraphs 5 and 6.2. The convenor will require the party or their representative to close their case or cease their questioning immediately this time limit is reached.

# 8. Considering the decision

- 8.1. The hearing will conclude after all parties have presented their case and responded to any questions. The panel will then deliberate on its decision by whatever means it considers to be appropriate. The panel will consider their decision in private.
- 8.2. The panel may, while it is considering its decision, seek advice from legal or licensing officers, either verbally or in writing. Officers will limit their advice to the specific issue identified by the panel
- 8.3. When the panel has reached its decision, it may ask the legal, licensing or committee officers to review and offer observations on the draft decision notice.

# 9. Communicating the decision

9.1. The decision will be sent in writing to all parties in accordance with the regulations.

#### PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The Licensing Authority has received an application for the grant of a premises licence for Craft and Common, 45 Woodlands Road, Ansdell. There have been representations from "other persons" as defined by the Act and as such a hearing must be held to determine the application.

#### RECOVERABILITY

This decision is not recoverable because it relates to a decision relating to the determining of any approval, consent, license, permission or registration.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That the Panel considers the application and determines to either:

- c) Refuse to specify the person in the licence as a premises supervisor,
- d) reject the application.

Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

#### a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

- The primary purpose of the premises shall be that of a craft studio where the provision of crafting activities is an important element of the premises' operation. Sufficient furniture and seating shall be provided and set out so it does not become a high volume vertical drinking establishment.

- Food shall be available until 9.30pm.

- Seating shall be provided inside the premises for at least 80% of the total maximum capacity of the premises as determined by a risk assessment.

- The backyard, which sits 2 stories to beneath the shop floor to the rear, will only be accessed and used by customers in the event of a fire, where this is one of our fire exit routes and evacuation points.

- When/if used, the outside area to the front of the shop will be closed by 8pm and furniture moved from outside the premises by 8.30pm.

- A health and safety risk assessment will be carried out every 6 months.

- CCTV will be installed throughout the public areas and will have storage lasting 28 days.

- Staff will be trained in the sale of alcohol and the conditions in this premises licence – a training register will be kept

training register will be kept.

#### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- An incident log book will be kept at the premises detailing the following; refusals, visits from relevant authorities, any acts of disorder.

- Safe capacity limits
- Signage
- A specified time of 30 mins between last sales and the close of premises.

#### c) Public safety

- A fire risk assessment will be carried out and a fire evacuation policy will be completed. Staff will be trained every 6 months.

- Safe capacity limits
- Staff trained in and informed of public safety measures.

#### d) The prevention of public nuisance

- Music will be predominantly background level and doors/windows will be kept closed where practicable.

- Signage asking patrons to leave quietly and respect neighbours
- No bright lights outside the premises.

- Access to public transport time tables (train and bus) to avoid unnecessary gatherings outside of the premises in public areas.



What are your concerns? I have lived in Lytham St Annes for. 76 years, 2 in St Annes 15 in Lytham and 59 in Ansdell. I think I know Ansdell as well as anyone. I'm on holiday but feel so concerned about this application, a concern shared by my neighbours, that I must make this representation again. I note that the applicants do not have to resubmit their business plan (BP) but I have to submit a new representation, despite being told that the applicants have yet again changed their application. Clearly it is in their interest to do so, but how can these be genuine when they have not changed their (BP). They are still able to have "girly nights" otherwise known as "hen parties" and to avoid discrimination, presumably boys nights known as stag nights ? From my personal experience as a licensing magistrate over several years I know how these applications can appear reasonable but can easily be manipulated over time. The (BP) is little more than a blueprint for a drinking establishment in the middle of a quiet residential area. There are even questions to be asked as to how the (BP) is supported by the physical plan. They say in the BP they will provide meals, but there is no kitchen, not enough seats for the 32 covers, and no extractor fan ( thank goodness for the latter). It would appear that there would be standing and drinking at the bar, perhaps with children present 1) Prevention of Crime and Disorder I do not feel that this is an honest application for a " Craft " establishment, but rather an application for a drinking establishment. The applicants appear to have little knowledge of such applications perhaps indicated by their need to apply a second time. There is little active policing, and a current burglary issue, which they seem to have difficulty in preventing. Neighbours of mine are talking about needing to move elsewhere. A late night drinking establishment is not required, we have well established pubs at the Fairhaven and Blossoms, and craft classes could easily be accommodated at the Ansdell Institute. 2) Prevention of Public Nuisance There can be little of more nuisance to local residents than the noise and nuisance caused by people leaving licensed premises late at night. Both pubs mentioned are well established and well managed as is Ansdell Institute, all are a considerable distance from their neighbours. 45 Woodlands Rd is a terraced property with 8 apartments attached to it. More across the road at the corner of Woodlands Rd and Windsor Rd, a residential facility at the corner of Woodlands Rd and Kingsway and yet another Seabourne Crescent a block of flats ALL within a few yards of 45

Woodlands Rd. Whilst an assurance has been given that there will be no immediate use of the area fronting No 45, if granted can we be surprised to see alcohol being drunk on what we currently regard as a pavement? 3)Protection of Children from Harm There are very young children living inside the property and it is neighbours living within a close proximity that are expressing the most concern. You may feel that more should have made representation, but there are several reasons why they haven't. Not least, not knowing what is proposed, as unlike planning applications neighbours are not notified, local papers are not bought as often as in the past, particularly by cash strapped families, and other reasons of which I'm aware our local councillors have been informed. The extent to which young children will be exposed to drinking, and until what time is not clear to me from their business plan. Finally, you must decide whether or not you take a risk, and allow the application despite the issues I have raised in line with 3 of the 4 Objectives required within the Act, and hope problems and upset to the young and old do not materialise, or do you support your constituents in our concerns and our strongly held opinion that this application should be rejected Regards.

Suggested amendments I see nothing but problems if this application is granted. I have received no response to my request to see the risk assessment reports if any from the police, fire service etc. although my previous and this representation will be shown to the applicants. If the application is granted we will expect to see restrictions being applied that you feel will appropriately address the concerns we have raised.

I am a tenant at Woodlands Road, Lytham St Annes, FY81DA and wish to raise an objection to the licensing application regarding Craft and Common LTD, 45 Woodlands Road, FY81DA which I believe would be detrimental to the area.

As a quick overview, Woodlands Road is divided into 2 distinct areas by the railway bridge, the area in discussion being the most residential, with just a few 9-5 Monday to Saturday businesses bar a takeaway which operates 7 days per week, it is very quiet in the evening with little footfall bar local residents, local families and dog walkers heading to the beach, there are a number of residential flats above the businesses and directly opposite the proposed Craft & Common is Windsor Lodge which is a large retirement flat complex housing elderly people.

The selling of alcohol in this area would encourage a drinking culture which invariably makes its ways out into the local streets.

An Alcohol licence will draw unwelcome attention and increased footfall at unsociable hours to this normally quiet residential area comprising of residential flats above the businesses and old people's homes, indeed directly opposite the proposed business Craft and Common LTD only metres away is Windsor Lodge (as mentioned above), also nearby is a sheltered housing complex and 2 funeral homes.

Furthermore the selling of alcohol does not sit well from a child protection point of view, the establishment states it provides crafts for all ages, alcohol and children do certainly not go hand in hand.

I believe noise, public nuisance, anti-social behaviour, low-level nuisance (non-reportable crime inc. shouting, littering) will be increased; evening opening times in a normally quiet residential area will unnecessarily draw people from a wider area at unsociable hours. Signage will also be visible from a distance which will add to additional draw of pedestrians and vehicles.

Noting again this is a quiet residential area and I believe noise, light pollution, traffic and traffic noise will have a negative impact on this area. Additional traffic to an already busy road in the daytime could have serious public safety implications.

I believe the proposed business Craft and Common LTD will attract considerably more traffic than the area can handle, leading to congestion on the immediate main road as well as in the surrounding residential roads which are already full every day, this would have a detrimental effect to existing businesses in daytime hours. The application states capacity will be 37 seated plus 11 standing taking the total to 48, with staff this will most likely rise to over 50 people potentially creating a very busy venue. This will also likely mean groups outside smoking / talking etc. I believe this is a real concern, this will cause overshadowing to the main residential entrance to 47 Woodlands Rd (8 residential homes) plus the residential entrance to a number of flats at 45 Woodlands Rd.

In light of the above objections I raise, I strongly believe this application requires re-reviewing and resubmitting; also I believe the application is unclear and the following 3 points require clarification.

- 1. Has a pavement licence now been applied for as the new application and plans still show the area of licensable activity (marked in red) extends outside? The available outside space is very small, indeed the perimeter of the outdoor space towards the road has a very large fixed planter on one corner and a tree on the opposite restricting space even further and the outside space is extremely close to the residential entrances to number 45 and 47 Woodlands Rd. No intended seating outside has been shown on the plans and will this increase capacity? Also are there any plan to store kegs outside the front of the business? These would be an obstruction and absolute eyesore.
- 2. The application states food will be served until 9.30pm but the plans show no kitchen nor ventilation for such?
- 3. The submitted plans do not clearly indicate the layout of the building, being one of the highest points in the area although the proposed entrance to Craft and Common LTD is on the ground floor on Woodlands Road, the back entrance which I assume will also be emergency exit is two floors lower due to the building being on a hill, the dining/craft area, store room and gents toilet will therefore directly overlook the back yard of 49 Woodlands Road and neighbouring properties on Woodlands Road, plus the back street and rear of the properties on Princes Road.

Furthermore, I can only assume that the commercial rubbish (including cans and bottles which will be very noisy when disposed of), and kegs from the business will be stored amongst the existing tenants' rubbish at 49 Woodlands Road, potentially causing a health and safety issue and furthermore will cause extra noise at unsocial hours causing widespread disturbance in the neighbourhood. Extra traffic of deliveries/removal of commercial waste will make it difficult for residents to negotiate access to their properties and garages.

Thank you for taking the time to consider these objections, I hope they will be seriously considered. I understand that the Mayor and local councillor are also in support of objections from residents.


I need to make an objection to the licensing application for premises 45 Woodlands Rd Ansdell. My objection is based on prevention of public nuisance.
