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LICENSING ACT 2003

THE LICENSING ACT 2003 (HEARINGS) REGULATIONS 2005 PROCEDURE FOR THE CONDUCT OF HEARINGS

1. Preliminary

- 1.1. Under the regulations, the Licensing Authority is required to determine the procedure that it proposes to follow at any hearing under the Act. This document sets out the procedure that Fylde will normally follow.
- 1.2. A panel may decide to follow a different procedure at any hearing. If it does, it will specifically draw attention to any departures from the procedures set out in this document and the reasons for them.
- 1.3. Please refer to the regulations for other rules about procedure

2. Interpretation

In this procedure, the following words or phrases have the following meanings:

3. Before the hearing

- 3.1. At least ten days before the hearing, the panel will meet to consider:
 - 3.1.1. If the circumstances set out in regulation 9(1)apply, whether to dispense with holding a hearing;
 - 3.1.2. What, if any, particular points it considers it will want clarification on at the hearing from a party under regulation 7(1)(d), and
 - 3.1.3. What time limit to set under regulation 24.
- 3.2. If it is not practicable for the panel to meet to consider these matters, the convenor may ascertain the views of panel members separately and give effect to the majority view as if it had been reached in a meeting of the panel.

4. Opening the hearing

- 4.1. The convenor will identify all parties to the hearing who are present. The convenor will also identify any persons who are present who intend to assist or represent any party and any witnesses.
- 4.2. The convenor will then explain to the parties the procedure to be followed at the hearing, specifically drawing attention to any departures from the procedures set out in this document and the reasons for them. The convenor will also inform the parties that the proceedings will be recorded.
- 4.3. The panel will then consider any request by a party under regulation 8(2) for another person to appear at the hearing. The convenor will give any party who has made such a request (or their representative) which the panel proposes to deny an opportunity to address the panel about their request. The panel will then re-consider the request.
- 4.4. The convenor may invite any officer to carry out any functions under this paragraph.

5. Listening to the parties

- 5.1. Each of the parties will then be invited to:
 - 5.1.1. Open their case by addressing the panel;
 - 5.1.2. Give any further information requested by the panel under regulation 7(1)(d);
 - 5.1.3. Present the evidence of any witness; and
 - 5.1.4. Conclude their case by addressing the panel.
- 5.2. The order in which the parties will be invited to put their cases will be in the discretion of the panel, except that a party who is an applicant will be invited to put their case last.

6. Questioning the parties

- 6.1. Members of the panel may, following the conclusion of the case of each party, ask questions of that party or any witness appearing for them.
- 6.2. A party or their representative may only question another party if they have asked for permission from the panel after the panel members have finished questioning that party or their witness. The panel will only give permission if it is satisfied that the questioning will provide useful information about a matter relevant to their determination which is unlikely to be placed before the panel without such questioning

7. Time limits

Each party will be limited to the time set by the panel under regulation 24 in which to exercise their rights provided in paragraphs 5 and 6.2. The convenor will require the party or their representative to close their case or cease their questioning immediately this time limit is reached.

8. Considering the decision

- 8.1. The panel will consider their decision in private.
- 8.2. No officers will retire with the panel except for the committee administrator. The committee administrator may, if requested to do so, provide procedural, but not legal or technical, advice to the panel. The committee administrator will also assist the panel by drafting and finalising the wording of the panel's decision, if requested by the panel.
- 8.3. The panel may, while it is considering its decision, seek advice from legal or licensing officers. Officers will limit their advice to the specific issue identified by the panel and will leave the room where the panel is considering its decision as soon as that advice has been given and understood.

9. Announcing the decision

- 9.1. When the panel has made its decision, the public part of the meeting will resume.
- 9.2. The convenor will read out the decision of the panel, or may invite the committee administrator to do so. The meeting will then close or move on to the next business.

Consideration

- 5. As relevant representations have been made, it is the duty of the panel to take such of the steps set out below as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:
 - (a) modify the conditions of the licence,
 - (b) reject the whole or part of the application.

Further Information

- 9. The applicant has agreed a number of additional conditions with the Lancashire Constabulary, a responsible authority under the Act as detailed below:
 - 1. In the outside area, the supply of intoxicating liquor shall be by waiter/waitress service only and only to persons seated at tables.
 - 2. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that staff monitor and adequately manage any queue that forms to gain entry to the premises.
 - 3. An adequate number of licensed door supervisors shall be on duty as appropriate to any risk assessment. As a minimum, one member of door staff is to be employed at the venue on Friday and Saturday evenings from 2100 hours until close of business.
 - 4. Adequate provision shall be made to prevent unauthorised access to the storage of empty bottles.
 - 5. Whenever licensable activities are available at the premises a waiter/waitress service shall be available. However, in the outside area, the supply of intoxicating liquor shall be by waiter/waitress service only and only to persons seated at tables.
 - 6. No customers will be admitted to the premises after midnight. For the avoidance of doubt, this condition shall not apply to those customers who were on the premises prior to midnight, and who exited the premises for the purpose of smoking.
 - 7. A drugs prevention strategy for the premises shall be developed and applied to include any reasonable recommendations of Lancashire Constabulary.
 - 8. Where there is reasonable suspicion that drugs are being carried the licence holder shall ensure that the outer clothing, pockets and bags of those entering the premises are searched by a trained staff member of the same sex.
 - 9. Any customers known to the management to have been previously convicted of committing criminal offences relating to drugs shall be excluded from the premises.
 - 10. No person in possession of a drink in a sealed or unsealed container will be allowed to enter the premises except for the purposes of delivery.
 - 11. All members of staff shall receive suitable training with regard to serving drunks and are to receive regular refresher training at intervals of a maximum of six months. Records to evidence this will be made available to an authorised officer upon request.
 - 12. Any person within the premises who appears to be intoxicated or who is behaving in a disorderly manner will be asked to leave the premises and will be escorted off the premises in a calm and appropriate manner.

- 13. Children under 16 shall vacate the premises by 2200 unless partaking in a meal or family function.
- 14. Patrons shall not be permitted to consume drinks in the external areas to the front and rear of the premises after 2200 each evening. Signs shall be displayed in prominent positions warning customers that they will not be permitted to eat or drink in the area after this time.
- 15. A Challenge 25 proof of age policy shall be implemented and adhered to. All staff to have received suitable training in relation to the Challenge 25 proof of age scheme. Records to evidence this will be made available to an authorised officer upon request.
- 16. Any person who looks or appears to be under the age of 25 shall be asked to provide identification that they are over the age of 18. The following are the only forms of identification acceptable:
 - a. A recognised proof of age card accredited under the British Retail Consortium's Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS)
 - b. Photo driving licence
 - c. Citizen card supported by the Home Office
 - d. Official ID card issued by HM Forces or European Union bearing a photograph and date of birth of the holder.
 - e. Any form of identification which may be locally or nationally approved in the future If no suitable identification is provided, the sale of alcohol to them will be refused.
- 17. All staff who are involved in the sale of alcohol shall receive suitable training in relation to the proof of age scheme to be applied upon the premises. All staff are to receive regular refresher training at intervals of a maximum of six months. Records to evidence this will be made available to an authorised officer upon request.
- 18. Suitable signage will be displayed to specify that a Challenge 25 Policy is in place.

The following conditions to be removed from the operating schedule:

- 1. There shall be in place for the premises a policy to prevent the sale or supply of alcohol to persons under 18 years of age. That policy shall require any person who appears to be under the age of 21 years to produce a recognised proof of age card accredited under the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) or if a proof of age card is not available a photo driving licence or passport indicating that they are over 18 years of age.
- 2. All staff shall receive appropriate training in relation to the proof of age scheme to be applied upon the premises. Records to evidence this shall be made available to an authorised officer upon request.
- 3. An adequate number of licensed door supervisors shall be on duty as appropriate to any risk assessment and in accordance with the guidance under the Nightsafe Scheme. Such risk assessments shall be documented and kept on the premises and provided to the enforcement authorities on request.

10. The applicant and the makers of the relevant representations have been invited to attend or be represented at the hearing.

I refer to the application for a variation of the premises licence at this property. The application refers to the hours being extended to 8am to the following 1am on every day, with the use of the front terrace for the consumption of food and drink to 2200.

I am initially concerned about the reference in the application to the site being known as 'Capri Grand Café and Bar'. The premises has a lawful planning use as a Class A3 café/restaurant and so I must take this opportunity to ensure the applicant is made aware that this does not extend to it operating as a bar as that would fall within Class A4 of the Use Classes Order and so require a planning application for a change of use, unless the bar element was at an ancillary level to the restaurant element.

As the applicant's cover letter states, the hours sought in the premises licence is in excess of the hours permitted by the planning permission for the premises. This control is condition 3 of planning permission 04/0030 and has been varied a number of times since, most recently by application 12/0641 which was approved on 19 December 2012. The relevant condition states:

The internal area of the premises shall only be open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 hours and 23:30 on Sundays to Thursdays (inclusive) and, on Fridays and Saturdays, between the hours of 08:00 hours and 00:30 (the following morning), with the external dining area to the front of the premises only open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 and 21:00 on any day.

The reason for the condition explains that it is to control the potential for disturbance to neighbouring residential occupiers, and with the property having an independent residential dwelling attached to it I am concerned that the hours proposed would not adequately protect the residential amenity of the occupiers of that property.

In addition, I recall from discussions with the applicant regarding the various applications to extend the planning hours to their current level, the need for these hours has been said to be to enable a 'dinner' sitting to be served in the restaurant. I am surprised to now see the desire to extend the hours to 1am as that seems particularly late for diners in a restaurant to be eating.

I refer to the premises licence consultations at Henrys and Capri for which I have previously provided comments, and ask that this email is added to those.

The applications both seek to extend the hours that the premises are able to operate beyond those permitted by the planning permissions, and I have highlighted the conflict that this brings in my earlier email. The purpose of the planning conditions is to strike a balance between the economic benefits that the premises bring to the borough and the need to ensure that the operation of the premises does not detract from the residential amenity of the occupiers of their numerous neighbouring dwellings to the premises. In both cases the current conditions were introduced relatively recently, and in both cases I am aware that there have been complaints from these neighbours about the operation of the premises causing disturbance to the neighbouring residents.

I understand that the consideration of these premises licence applications needs to examine how the applicants will preserve the four licence objectives. I am concerned that the extended hours proposed here will fail to comply with the 'prevention of public nuisance' objective as the opening of these premises later into the evening has the potential to cause noise nuisance to the occupiers of numerous premises. I understand that the council's Environmental Protection officers will be submitting representations opposed to these applications, and I can confirm that their position has the support of the planning service.

I am also concerned that the applicant is seeking the amendment to the premises licence on the basis that they wish for parity with other premises. I understand these premises to be 7 Dicconson Terrace, and so to assist the Panel I can clarify that the current application would be in excess of the hours that premises can trade, which are limited to between 08:00 hours and 23:30 on Sundays to Thursdays (inclusive) and between the hours of 08:00 hours and 01:00 (the following morning) on Fridays and Saturdays with the external dining area to the rear of the premises shall only be open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 and 20:00 on any day and the external dining area to the front of the premises shall only be open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 and 21:00 on any day. This is secured by condition 4 of planning permission 14/0123 and condition 5 of 12/0664 which relates to 7a Dicconson Terrace only.

With reference to the above application there is the following representation from **Environmental Protection:**

The premises is situated on Dicconson Terrace just off Henry Street but shares a property boundary with an owner occupied dwelling and there are residents further round towards central beach. Complaints, especially in the Summer months have been received regarding loud music and noise from patrons in the outside area to the front of the premises.

People noise at the front of the premises is more difficult to control. The only option is to limit how long this takes place. This is why during the initial application for the premises the outside area was required to close at 9pm. Therefore in order to maintain this I would ask that the current hours of operation remain the same so that the residents are not disturbed later into the night and I feel the current hours of operation are a reasonable compromise.

Complaints have also been received regarding excessive noise from amplified music and disturbance can extend into the early hours of the morning at the weekends. Sometimes the general hub bub of the premises can be heard through the party wall and may not subside until the premises closes.


If this has the potential to be permitted for all days then I feel that the nuisance may become unacceptable. Local residents accept that they are adjacent to a town centre so cannot expect the same level of comfort as residents in more rural or residential settings, however local businesses also have a responsibility to ensure that they do not cause nuisance. Indeed it is the Society's view that a public nuisance is already happening through the present use of the premises and will be made much worse by the longer hours of operation.

Our client believes that the facts speak for themselves. If a night spot is placed next door to or adjacent to residential property the quiet enjoyment of the occupants of those residences will be severely prejudiced by people noise and loud music. Furthermore the night spot will attract considerable traffic noise, e.g. the arrival and departure of taxis and the opening and closing of car doors.

3. For the above reasons the Society is of the view that the proposed substantial variation to the existing licence should not be permitted. It will undoubtedly seriously disturb the balance of amenity for residents who live in the area.

We hope this letter will be of assistance in clarifying the Society's concerns.

As the owner and occupant of the dwellinghouse 2 Dicconson Terrace, Lytham which is attached to and immediately adjoins the Capri premises, I am writing to register my objection in the strongest possible terms to the above application.

I enclose a copy of a letter dated the 11th December 2012 to the Council making them aware of my concerns in respect of the previous application for variation of the premises licence which was determined by the committee on the 14th December 2012.

The grounds of my objection are two-fold, namely:

- 1. The prevention of public nuisance in and outside the Capri premises,
- 2. The prevention of crime and disorder in and outside the premises.

I make the following specific comments in support of these grounds of objection:

- A. As described in my 2012 letter (page 2), the Capri premises are in essence being used primarily not as a restaurant but as night spot in our quiet part of Dicconson Terrace during the evenings and especially during the late permitted hours of operation of the licence on Friday and Saturday nights.
- B. This has made my life a misery. The activities next door have caused me, at 90 years of age, a huge amount of stress and sleepless nights. I am aware from conversations with neighbours

who have also registered objections that the use of the premises by the licensee (including breaches of the present licence) have likewise affected their quiet enjoyment of their homes and caused them stress and worry.

- C. From my perspective there are two prime causes of this distress, these being:
 - i. Loud pop music emanating from the premises, especially at the weekend. Despite the conditions attached to the 2012 licence prohibiting music being played to the outside area of the premises, the speakers to which I make reference on page 2 of my previous letter remain in place. Every time I go to bed I am full of apprehension as to whether this music will be put on. Thankfully some nights the music cannot be heard outside the premises. However on other nights the volume is turned up making it impossible for me to sleep when I retire for bed at 9.00 p.m. The only way I am able to cope with this at all is by putting on my wireless to deaden the noise.

As reported in my previous letter, the constant beat of this music distresses me greatly and is making my life in the home which I have occupied for the last 60 years almost unbearable.

- ii. People noise out on the street and especially within the canopy area. I hear the frequent screams of women and men shouting right outside my bedroom which adjoins the premises. This continues unabated until about 11.00 p.m. (I wish to be scrupulously fair and make clear that the noise quietens down after about this time). As far as I can ascertain, this people noise is from patrons of Capri coming in and out of the main building and patrons also standing and smoking under the canopy area.
- D. I felt reassured by the conditions which were attached to the Council's variation of the licence in 2012 and representations made by the licensee to the 2012 hearing (I enclose my solicitor's notes of this hearing). Planning consent for the canopy was subsequently refused. This also comforted me that this large obtrusive canopy would be removed.

This comfort was very short-lived. The canopy is still there and the assurances given by the licensee to the Council have not been implemented. I have the impression that the licensee is constantly testing the boundaries with the Council to see what he can get

away with without the Council taking action.

In the absence of the Licensing Authority coming to me aid I was compelled to register complaints with the Council on a number of occasions during 2013. The Council appears to be unwilling to take action against the licensee and to have the canopy removed, despite its existence being unlawful. When Council officers intervene the licensee modifies unacceptable activities for a while and then they resume. I regard this as evidence of the licensee's blatant disregard forregulatory matters.

Furthermore, I have experienced manifestations of the licensee's unhappiness with the outcome of the 2012 hearing. Shortly after this hearing and the refusal of listed building consent and planning consent for the canopy (later in December 2012) bricks were thrown from the rear yard of the Capri premises into my rear yard. On another occasion a pair of old shoes were flung at my front window. On another occasion a bag of rubbish was flung at my rear gate. On a further occasion a Mercedes car belonging to someone at Capri was illegally parked on the forecourt to my garage from first thing in the morning until late in the evening.

This intimidatory conduct caused me to think very carefully before joining issue with the licensee, but because I felt very strongly that I should be able to live in my own home in peace and tranquility I continued to register my distress with the Council.

Some time during last year I heard loud banging on the Capri side of an internal wall which separates the back of the Capri premises from my kitchen. I understand that my neighbours were installing hi-fi equipment. Considerable damage was occasioned to this wall which is over a century old. The ingress into the wall considerably reduced its sound-insulating qualities. This resulted for a considerable time in my hearing voices emanating from next door which caused be to be very wound up. Following complaints some effort is now being made by the Capri management to reduce this noise factor, for which I am grateful.

In the absence of the Council coming to my aid I am quite simply at the mercy of the licensee.

Council representatives have helped me to an extent but they have explained that they only have limited powers given the terms of the licence and the general law. In the early part of last year I was greatly disturbed by the constant slamming of the rear door to the Capri premises. The Council intervened and thankfully this nuisance is no longer continuing.

I was advised via my lawyers that I could make application to the Council to review the licence terms. Because my life was so unbearable I took steps to assemble evidence in support of such an application.

However on the 7th October 2013 my brother Guy Penn died very suddenly. Neither Guy nor myself were married and we shared our home together (initially with my parents) for 60 years. I was greatly traumatised by Guy's death and am only slowly recovering from his loss. I felt I could not cope with fighting the licensee at that time. However the present application is of course now compelling me to act

I conclude by expressing the hope that the committee will reject the application to vary the terms of the licence. I was horrified to read that the licensee is seeking to increase the night time use of the premises throughout the period Monday to Saturday to 1.00 a.m. with half an hour's drinking up time. If this is permitted the nuisance and disorder factors which I have highlighted will become of much longer duration. I really believe that if this happens I will be driven out of my home and the whole character of this part of Lytham will irredeemably change for the worse. No-one will want to live there. This cannot be right.

Licensing Hearing - 14 December 2012 at 9.30 a.m. Application for the variation of a premises licence re Capri, 4a Dicconson Terrace, Lytham

My brother Guy Penn and myself are the owners of 2 Dicconson Terrace, Lytham which immediately adjoins the Capri premises.

We have lived in our home for about the last 60 years, the property originally having been purchased by our parents.

I am now 89 years old and my brother is 83. Last year my brother had one of his legs amputated to the knee and is in residential care. Accordingly I now live in the property on my own.

After a very busy and I think useful life spent in the Lytham community, I was very disturbed to receive various Notices from the Council in mid-October informing me about the above application and also planning applications made by Mr. Robinson for a change of use of the Capri premises and for the erection of a large outside canopy in front of the existing building.

Both my brother and I oppose these prospective changes. I understand from those advising us that there is a recommendation from the officers dealing with the planning applications to reject the proposed change of use and the canopy. I am told that these planning applications will come before the Council for a decision towards the end of this month.

Within a day or two of receiving notice of these applications Mr. Robinson started to construct the canopy. The Council enforcement officer went round but the Council failed to take any steps to require the canopy to be removed. I was told that the construction of the canopy and its use is unlawful but the Council is unable to take any enforcement action until the outcome of the planning applications.

Mr. Robinson has also on a regular basis obtained temporary consents to sell alcohol and transmit pop music within and outside the Capri building. This has enabled him to fundamentally change the nature of his business and in effect to operate a night spot in this quiet part of Dicconson Terrace on a week-by-week basis and to the late hours of Friday and Saturday night.

Since then my life has been a misery. The activities next door have caused me a huge amount of stress and sleepless nights.

Residing where I do I am used to living in close proximity to Lytham's night life. This does not worry or inconvenience me and I am not the sort of person who readily complains. However the night time use of the Capri premises by Mr. Robinson has prevented me from living a normal life in my own home and this is seriously affecting my health. This is why at a time in my life when I do not wish to be involved in conflict I have been compelled to take issue with Mr. Robinson and to bring the facts to the attention of the Council.

The prime cause of all this distress since October has been loud pop music emanating from the Capri premises, especially at the weekend. This has been made worse because speakers have been put in place which take the music outside the building into the area where the canopy is and indeed out into the street. This not only makes a bad situation worse for me and my neighbours but is also an unwarranted intrusion on the lives of everyone who are compelled to hear it. Surely this should not be permitted. Because of all this I am now having to endure life in my home with constant pop music with all its beats and sounds from late afternoon until the very late part of the evening, sometimes going beyond midnight.

I have tried to address this noise by not using my living room which is immediately adjacent to the Capri premises. I also occupy a bedroom which, of the three bedrooms, is furthest away from Capri. Despite this I can hear the constant beat of the music in my hall where I retire to read in the evening and in my bedroom. This makes it very difficult to get to sleep and to enjoy my life in a way which I feel I have a right to expect in my own home.

Acting on advice, Guy and I commissioned a specialist sound report from acoustic specialists. I attach a copy of this report. I am very concerned to read in this report that what I already consider to be an unacceptable level of sound is likely to get far worse if the present use of the premises continues into the summer when the hours of daylight are longer and more people are likely to be drinking and smoking at the Capri premises to the late hours of the evening. At my advanced age I really do not think that I will be able to cope with this and may be forced out of my home.

My fears as to the future level of disturbance were reinforced one Sunday evening a few weeks back. The weather was reasonably good and there appeared to be a lot of people in the town, possibly attending some event or other. At about 4.45 p.m. very loud music started to emanate from the Capri premises at a far higher level than I had experienced previously. It was truly awful. The noise was unbearable to an extent that I thought at one stage I would have to leave the house. I was fearful about complaining in case I got the blame for stopping the activity. I hoped that other members of the public would complain because it must have been unacceptable to everyone in and around Dicconson Terrace. I concluded that public complaints had been made because this music was eventually turned down to a lower level at about 7.45 p.m. I am extremely worried that if the consents and licences are granted this loud music will be a constant feature in the lives of myself and my neighbours.

Other residential occupiers in the vicinity of Capri share my worries and concerns. Neighbouring owners I have spoken to have expressed concerns similar to my own and have made it clear that they support the steps I am taking.

I am told that previous permissions to Capri restricted the use of the area outside the building to 9.00 p.m. for the very good reason that it protects the public well-being and in particular people like myself and my neighbours.

I am also told that outside verandahs to pubs and restaurants have become popular recently because smoking has been prohibited in such places. I suspect this is the reason why Mr. Robinson wishes to put this very large canopy in position. It is so large it reaches the bedroom windows of my house! Does this mean that I can no longer open the windows of my home in the better months of the year because of the problems of smoke and loud conversation? Surely this should not be permitted. I have been professionally advised that it is possible for restrictions to be placed by the Council on smoking in such places after say 7.00 p.m. or 8.00 p.m. Whilst such restrictions would clearly help, they will not resolve the major problems which I and my neighbours are facing.

It also seems to me that Mr. Robinson acquired the premises in full knowledge of the existing licensing and planning restrictions which had been put in place for good reason. It seems totally wrong to me that he should now be able to fly in the face of these restrictions and impose such hardship on my neighbours and myself simply in order to generate more profit for himself.


I therefore appeal with all my heart to the committee to help me and my neighbours in our current plight by refusing the applications.



I refer to the application for a variation of the premises licence at this property. The application refers to the hours being extended to 10am to the following 1.30am on Sunday to Thursday with no change to Friday and Saturdays although the existing licensable hours for those days are not stated.

As the applicant's cover letter states, the hours sought in the premises licence is in excess of the hours permitted by the planning permission for the premises. This control is under 99/0131 and has been varied a number of times since, most recently by application 11/0741 which was approved on 14 March 2012. The relevant part of the condition states:

That the use of the premises for the sale or consumption of food and drink to the public shall not be undertaken outside of the hours of:

Thursday -

Sunday to Wednesday (inclusive) - 7.00am to 23.30pm

I refer to the premises licence consultations at Henrys and Capri for which I have previously provided comments, and ask that this email is added to those.

The applications both seek to extend the hours that the premises are able to operate beyond those permitted by the planning permissions, and I have highlighted the conflict that this brings in my earlier email. The purpose of the planning conditions is to strike a balance between the economic benefits that the premises bring to the borough and the need to ensure that the operation of the premises does not detract from the residential amenity of the occupiers of their numerous neighbouring dwellings to the premises. In both cases the current conditions were introduced relatively recently, and in both cases I am aware that there have been complaints from these neighbours about the operation of the premises causing disturbance to the neighbouring residents.

I understand that the consideration of these premises licence applications needs to examine how the applicants will preserve the four licence objectives. I am concerned that the extended hours proposed here will fail to comply with the 'prevention of public nuisance' objective as the opening of these premises later into the evening has the potential to cause noise nuisance to the occupiers of numerous premises. I understand that the council's Environmental Protection officers will be submitting representations opposed to these applications, and I can confirm that their position has the support of the planning service.

I am also concerned that the applicant is seeking the amendment to the premises licence on the basis that they wish for parity with other premises. I understand these premises to be 7 Dicconson Terrace, and so to assist the Panel I can clarify that the current application would be in excess of the hours that premises can trade, which are limited to between 08:00 hours and 23:30 on Sundays to Thursdays (inclusive) and between the hours of 08:00 hours and 01:00 (the following morning) on Fridays and Saturdays with the external dining area to the rear of the premises shall only be open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 and 20:00 on any day and the external dining area to the front of the premises shall only be open to the public for the consumption of food and drink between the hours of 08:00 and 21:00 on any day. This is secured by condition 4 of planning permission 14/0123 and condition 5 of 12/0664 which relates to 7a Dicconson Terrace only.

With reference to the above premises licence variation there is the following representation from Environmental Protection.

A number of complaints have been received from nearby residents regarding excessive noise and ASB as a result of patrons using the establishment. These range from loud music which did result in serving a noise abtment notice in 2011 and from ASB in the street – shouting jeering, laughing etc. it is difficult to determine the number of complaints as speaking to one member of the public they said that they do not complain directly anymore and accept the situation. When visits are made on Friday or Saturday nights, it is observed that there is a general "noise" in the area of Henry Street from people outside waiting for taxis, walking passed residential property

Once patrons are on the street it is difficult to control this noise and disturbance, the only real option is to reduce the times of closing of the premises so that the resultant noise diminishes earlier. If premises are allowed to open later then this street noise will continue into the early hours thus prolonging the disturbance that the residents are suffering from. Residents are suffering with the disturbance at the weekend and if this was given permission for the weekdays – albeit I understand that it will not be every night – then I feel this will not be acceptable.

I appreciate that the residents live in a town centre and should not expect the same level of comfort as those in more rural or housing areas. However the licensed establishments must also be aware that their activities are causing nuisance to the residents. In my opinion the premises should not be allowed to operate beyond their current hours and would ask that the application is refused.



We are writing to you in order to register our objections in the strongest terms possible to the Licensing Hour Extensions that are currently under consideration for Henry's Bar on Henry Street Lytham and for Capri Grand Café & Bar on Dicconson Terrace — also in Lytham town centre.

We have lived within a few hundred metres of these two premises for 16 years and feel that we know the local area extremely well.

We would oppose the Licensing extensions on two principle grounds:

1/ The prevention of public nuisance

2/ Crime & Disorder

We have witnessed at first hand a steady increase of rowdy and aggressive groups of people, late at night, outside these two premises in recent years. We are also aware of a number of Lytham residents who have become fearful of walking down these streets late at night due to drunkenness and aggressive, threatening behaviour. The police are increasingly being called upon and there is a clear link between these problems and late night drinking. This is all a stark contrast to the relative peace that prevailed within the centre of Lytham prior to the advent of 24 hour drinking being introduced in 2005.

The proposed Licensing changes will clearly aggravate an already difficult situation that already exists and they should not be approved.
