RELEASE OF S106 MONIES – HOVE ROAD ST ANNES			

PUBLIC ITEM

This item is for consideration in the public part of the meeting.

SUMMARY

The report details proposed play area improvements at Hove Road, St. Annes.

The Committee are requested to agree to allocate S106 contributions of £1,275 for play area improvements at Hove Road, St Annes. The improvements will include replacement of worn and damaged safety surfacing and the provision of new parks furniture.

RECOMMENDATION

The Tourism and Leisure Committee are requested:

- 1. To recommend to the Finance and Democracy Committee approval of a fully funded revenue budget increase of £1,275 fully funded from the S106 contribution from the St. Albans Road development, to carry out play area improvement works at Hove Road, St. Annes as detailed in this report.
- 2. To award the above works to DCM Surfaces Ltd who, for the sum of £1,275, will undertake the agreed play improvements, subject to the approval of the fully funded budget increase by the Finance and Democracy Committee.

REPORT

- 1. The planning process generally requires housing developers to contribute towards improvements to public open space in the vicinity of the new development.
- 2. Fylde Council, as the Planning Authority, has received and is holding funds that have been secured through developer contributions associated with a housing development on St. Albans Road, St. Annes.
- 3. The terms of the Planning Agreement 08/0669 for the St. Albans Road development in relation to the public open space contribution states that the sum of £1,275 should be used by Fylde Council "To provide or improve or to facilitate the provision or improvement of public open space or the public realm likely to benefit the occupiers of the dwelling."
- 4. Officers from Parks and Coastal Services have requested that the total Section 106 contribution of £1,275 relating to the St. Albans Road development is released and allocated to play area improvement works at Hove Road, St Annes as stated in the Planning Agreement.
- 5. The Tourism and Leisure Committee are requested to consider allocating the total Section 106 contribution of £1,275 from the St. Albans Road development to help deliver the project as detailed in this report.

SCHEME DETAILS

- 6. The play area improvements will include the removal and disposal of old damaged rubber safety surfacing and replacement with new wet pour safety surfacing. Improvements will also include the purchase of new parks furniture items such as litter bins and benches.
- 7. These works will be undertaken in conjunction with the previously secured £50,000 play improvement capital as approved at the Budget Council meeting on the 4 March 2020.

SPITFIRE MEMORIAL			

PUBLIC ITEM

SUMMARY

The report seeks a decision on the adoption of the Spitfire Memorial at Fairhaven Lake by Fylde Council.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee are requested to:

- 1. Agree to accept the transfer of the ownership of the Spitfire memorial to Fylde Council at no cost.
- 2. Agree that Fylde Council takes on the management and maintenance of the Spitfire memorial for a minimum period of 20 years.
- 3. That the agreement entered into between Fylde Council and John Coombes dated 26/7/2012 be terminated and a new agreement drafted incorporating the terms set out in the report.
- 4. That the cost of annual maintenance of the Spitfire Memorial be met from existing budgets, although the periodic costs of refurbishment and repainting will need to be the subject of a capital bid at the appropriate time.

REPORT

BACKGROUND

- 1. In 2011 the former Leader, John Coombes approached the Council with a proposal to create and install a permanent memorial to be located in an appropriate position in Lytham St Anne's in recognition of the local efforts made during WW2 to fund the provision of a Spitfire aircraft in support of the war effort.
- 2. A report was considered by Cabinet in July 2011 which proposed several locations for the memorial including Fairhaven Lake Gardens. Cabinet endorsed the principle of the proposal to develop a Spitfire Memorial.
- 3. Subsequently Fairhaven Lake was selected as being the best location and an agreement entered into with Mr Coombes (the Licensee) dated 26 July 2012. This allows the siting of a full sized replica of a Mark VB Spitfire airplane memorial with associated landscaping and lighting. The Licensee is responsible for all maintenance, repair and insurance. The agreement runs for a period of 3 years from the date of the licence agreement and thereafter until the expiry of not less than 3 months notice given by either party.
- 4. Since installation, the Spitfire Memorial has been a popular attraction for visitors to Fairhaven Lake.
- 5. Last year Mr Coombes approached the Council to advise that there was less funding being generated by the Spitfire Display Team for the upkeep of the Memorial due to a number of factors. A consequence of this is that insurance cover has now expired. Without sustainable funding being realised there is a risk that the Spitfire will need to be removed. As a result, Mr Coombes has requested that the Council take over the ownership of the Memorial.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

6. Discussions have taken place to identify the ongoing maintenance responsibilities and costs involved. These are set out in the table below.

- 7. Officers have assessed and considered the above elements of ongoing costs and consider that the annual costs in the region of £2,000 can be met from existing budgets, although the periodic costs would need to be the subject of a capital bid at the appropriate time.
- 8. Provisionally agreed terms have been reached with the Licensee on the following basis:
 - a. That the Licensee will;
 - transfer the ownership of the Spitfire memorial to Fylde Borough Council at no cost, Value of the asset estimated at £130,000.
 - pass over any documents, manuals, or other information which may be necessary in the future management of the memorial.

- continue to update the memorial interpretation story boards to ensure information is kept up to date.
- b. That Fylde Borough Council will;
 - manage and maintain the Spitfire memorial for a minimum period of 20 years
- c. That the agreement entered into between Fylde Council and John Coombes dated 26/7/2012 will be terminated and a new agreement drafted incorporating the above.
- 9. Members are asked to consider the above request and to agree to take on the ownership and maintenance of the Spitfire Memorial as set out above.

CAPITAL SCHEME: IMPROVEMENTS TO CHILDREN'S PLAY AREAS

PUBLIC ITEM

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

The purpose of this report is to provide a progress update in respect of the capital scheme to improve children's play areas. Fylde Council's Parks and Coastal Service is responsible for the formal inspection, repair and record keeping of 37 children's play areas throughout the borough, of which 17 are owned by town and parish councils.

Officers carried out a condition survey of all the play areas, to establish the scale of replacement and longevity of equipment and surfacing, based on the regular inspection information, to provide an overarching perspective of what investment is required. A prioritised and phased list of annual works was collaborated to inform a repair and replacement programme, based on risk, condition, location and use.

At the Budget Council meeting of 4 March 2020, approval was confirmed for a capital growth item to the sum of £37,621 in respect of the play area improvements. Further grant funding to the value of £12,379 was also successfully secured from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government. The total capital contribution of £50,000 was moved to the 2020/21 Capital Programme. The funding will be allocated to the sites as show below:

Four suppliers were invited to tender using the 'quick quote' procedure on the CHEST procurement portal, in line with the council's contract procedures. Tenders were evaluated on a 70/30 price and quality basis.

We received one tender from DCM Surfaces Ltd. Their submitted price breakdown is illustrated on the table shown overleaf and they scored 70% on price and 30% on quality. Works will start in March 2021 and are expected to be completed by April 2021.

No 1: Improvements to Children's Play Areas

Fylde council own 17 formal children's play areas throughout St, Anne's, Ansdell and Lytham, with supplementary responsibility for 2 further play areas managed by charitable Trusts at Lowther Gardens and Park View Playing Fields.

The parks service is responsible for the formal inspection, repair and record keeping of these play areas. This service is also provided to the town and parish councils under an annual service level agreement.

All items of play equipment and surfacing are inspected weekly in line with RoSPA¹ guidance, by qualified Fylde Council play inspectors, with an independent inspection being undertaken by Fylde Council's insurance company, Zurich, once per year.

All faults and findings are classified as high, medium or low risk and rectified in priority order based on the level of risk. Relevant repairs are then carried out or the item is permanently or temporarily decommissioned.

All weekly and annual inspection results and remedial works are formally recorded and retained on a web-based inspection system to mitigate against any potential insurance claims.

In addition to the 'play and projects' team resource, Fylde council holds an operating budget to carry out repairs to the play equipment and surfacing. This budget is used for the replacement of 'worn' parts such as nuts, bolts, shackles, seats, panels, chains in addition to small repairs to rubber safety surfacing, fencing and furniture.

However, the council does not hold a budget for the replacement of failing or decommissioned play equipment or safety surfacing. Play equipment, surfacing and associated items on the play areas are in various condition from excellent to poor. As a rough guide, the lifespan of rubber safety surface is around 10 - 15 years, with play equipment around 10-30 years dependant on type, location, material and public use.

Fylde Council has been successful in recent years working with community groups in attracting external funding, diverting S106 funding into play improvements and replacement, but a longer term, sustainable approach is now required to address the gradual deterioration of the play facilities. Some remedial/replacement works are now required based on the formal inspection information. The priority works and estimated costs are listed in the table below.

The above works are required as a priority during 2020/21 at a total estimated cost of £50,000. The proposal is to request a capital investment of £37,621 to be used in conjunction with the Government grant of £12,379 described

below, to provide a budget of £50,000 in 2020/21.

Fylde has recently been awarded a grant of £12,379 from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government, which can be used for 'Renovating children's play areas, particularly where they have fallen into disuse or disrepair or where health and safety may be an issue;'

Extract from the grant offer letter:

'The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (the Department) is issuing a grant of £12,379 to Fylde Borough Council under powers in section 31 of the Local Government Act 2003. This will support work on those parks in your local area where you consider there is urgent need of refurbishment i.e. parks currently in disuse or at risk of closure due to health and safety concerns'.

Work will continue with community groups to gain external grant funding and the allocation of further S106 monies to maximise the impact of this play replacement budget and to ensure long term sustainability of the boroughs formal children's play areas.

COASTAL EXPLORERS PROJECT UPDATE				

PUBLIC ITEM

This item is for consideration in the public part of the meeting.

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

The Tourism and Leisure Committee has supported the development of an arts and cultural project to augment the new coastal sea defences from Fairhaven to Church Scar called Coastal Explorers. This project is planned to deliver a series of participative programmes and a creative hub which would be sited close to St Paul's Avenue Car Park at Fairhaven. This project has been further supported by a Member Working Group comprising the Chair and Vice Chair of the Tourism and Leisure Committee and the Chair and Vice Chair of the Operational Management Committee. Officers have recently presented an update to the member working group.

A funding application has now been made to the Big Lottery Fund for £180K to support the project. A further application for funding from Arts Council England of £50K will be made in Spring 2021. The Tourism and Leisure Committee has already agreed to £20K match funding which is currently included in the Capital programme 2020-21, subject to external funding applications being successful.



Coastal Explorers & The Coastal Defence

- £23 million secured through the Environment Agency to replace hard sea defences at Fairhaven, Church Scar and Granny's Bay
- Work began on site in January 2018
- Completion on site summer 2020
- A conversation began with the Arts Council England in 2016 and a research grant of £15,000 was secured in 2017 to explore opportunities for a public art intervention to complement the coastal defence scheme
- Arts Council England and Big Lottery encouraged the development of a second phase project







Coastal Explorers to date...

- In 2017 Fylde Council commissioned Arts Council National Portfolio Holder, Art Gene to consider ways to better facilitate people's understanding and experience of the coastline
- A programme of 9 targeted events took place over a period between July and October 2017 engaging over 1,800 participants and live audience members and over 330,000 online and broadcast viewers and listeners
- This initial research & development project entitled 'Coastal Explorers' was successful in its aim to engage the community in contemporary art practice though dialogue and to push the boundaries of art & design and its role in place making

Through the 'Coastal Explorers' consultation, Art Gene built a picture of Lytham & St Annes

the Biological Heritage Site.

Natural History - Gendolls could be used as bird hides, or a mobile base for beach cleaners or study groups. The structures will be able to go down onto the beach as needed towed by a fractory for rock pooling or marine study events and will generate their own power with wind turbines and solar panels.

6 STATIONS tamped platforms made from ecologically sourced hardwood with native planting and interpretation anund: the stations will act as optimizing event or viewing rase. Each stations has its own power supply. They can be used for events or without the mobile passes being present. Friends groups could be established to take ownership of each of the 6 stations and be consulted on developing a focus, events, planting and interpretive schemes referent to each site.

1. COMMUNITY GONDOLA Able to host small groups of up to 20 people - It has a charging point for electric bicycles and mobility scooters - an accessible composition plate! - seves good coffee and cale and has a marriany owes of the estuary. A regular programme of themed events could be organised. An activities base for groups - and a self-directed social activity gathering space. The space promotes health and well-being through a connection to londergace, culture and local heritage.

THE NATURAL

A ROCK POOLING AREA (fish nursery /artificial reef) Fully accessible for wheelchair and mobility scooter users - an immersive experiential space for all ages - intergenerational learning, health and well-being

LIVING WALL


We propose creating a pattern of sockets or ridges in the concrete of the new wall to accept native coastal wild flowers and grasses - softening the structure's steps and ramps and mediating the transition between land and sea. Suggested plants include Nellow horned poppy - Sea campion - and edibles gut he transition between land and Sea purstane. Grasses would include Marram and Spartinia - we may also label the plants by impressing words and highlight key historic sites along this stretch of coastline which would be further explored with the development of a mobile phone app. (See interpretation)

These works should add to a wider dune and coastal habitat improvement effort along the coastline and within the designated Biological Heritage Site and be linked to the proposed cell ladder biodiversity project linking Fairhaven lake to the sea.

Everything we build should consider habitat improvement as integral. Native wildflowers grasses and edibles. Anything from turf roofs and walls to bug hotel benches and grasscrete style pavements







Next Steps...

- In order to quantify the need for the development of a permanent scheme a second phase, pilot project has been developed to test a range of activities hosted from a temporary space located on the coastline
- The outlined project 'Sightlines & Shorelines' has been allocated 20k of council match funding in support of a National Lottery Reaching Communities grant application, which is in its final stage of development and preparation and now requires support and final agreement of the concept and forward plan

- **Sightlines & Shorelines Phase 2 'Test**' will identify concept user audiences and engage them in the use of a test 'space'. Through the development and delivery of themed activity programmes and partnership working, audiences will connect with the natural environment through participation in social activity across a range of arts, culture, environment and commercially focussed events, leisure and learning
- The customised test space will be appropriately located on the coastal path providing estuary views and a direct link to nature, it is proposed that the location for this will be St Paul's Avenue, Fairhaven promenade. Screened from Fairhaven Lake & Gardens to the rear by trees, this location provides the optimum location for access and connectivity
- Use of the space and the needs of its users will be robustly evaluated throughout the programme and opportunities to explore commercial viability will form a key aspect of the trial in order to both inform the physical requirements and support the business plan ahead of the next phase of the project







'The Point' – a temporary, customised space created from two 40ft shipping containers will host a programme activity from spring 2021 until Spring 2022. Timber cladded to the front facade and wrapped with a decked and planted area, the building will settle into the grassed interface between the promenade and Fairhaven Lake's perimeter tree line.

Sightlines & Shorelines programme overview...

- Sightlines & Shorelines is a 2 year pilot art and environment programme motivated by the desire to make Fylde's coastline more accessible to more people, regardless of physical or personal circumstance. It will deliver meaningful volunteer opportunities, develop skills, improve access, provide engagement and opportunities for local people of all ages and circumstances.
- In doing so, it will put local people at the heart of programming, delivering and engaging with Fylde's natural and cultural assets to create deeper connections to the coastline amongst residents so that it becomes more accessible to all, better appreciated and better understood.
- The Sightlines & Shorelines programme is comprised of 4 thematically linked strands co-created and delivered by the community in collaboration with professional artists and environmentalists in and around 'The Point' space.



- Green Loop is a 6-month participative workshop programme led by artist and producer, Nerissa Cargill-Thompson, and co-created and delivered by NEETS and young people age 16 – 40
- Focused on developing skills and knowledge connected to repurposing and retailing recycled plastic waste, participants of the programme will research, design and create a limited-edition, sustainable ethically produced range of wearable or home accessories made from recycled plastic and waste found in the Ribble Estuary
- Outputs retailed online & local craft markets, the wearable or home accessories range will be used to bring greater awareness of the human impact on our planet and local environment and show that beautiful items can come from sustainably sourced and recycled materials
- Green Loop will be enhanced by the delivery of a Sustainable Makers Market programme hosted at Fairhaven Lake and produced in collaboration with Hopeful & Glorious; and a separate artist commission created by Nerissa Cargill-Thompson, utilising plastic waste from the River Ribble and exhibited as a sustainable art trail through businesses in Fylde

Accessible River

- Accessible River includes an action research programme led by participative architects, North West Design Collective, in collaboration with a group of 20 Fylde residents who have a range of access needs due to physical or mental disabilities
- The purpose of the action research will be to understand and determine the scope of need for access along the new coastline defence scheme and to design a set of recommendations for a future approach to making the space more accessible.
- Activities will be focused on research and the testing of ideas through a suite of participative engagement workshops with outputs connected to target group opinions and creative cues for potential development at a later stage


Accessible River

- An artist commission with an interwoven, short participatory programme created by kinetic sculptor, Jim Bond will be inspired by the ecology and natural environment of the Fylde coast. The final artwork will create a pause moment along the coastline and will offer the public the opportunity to engage with the coast on a sensory or interactive level to encourage reflection and connection to the environment.

- A talk about the project and the artist's portfolio will be given as part of the wider arts event programme that will be delivered on site




Healing Garden

- The creation of a resource which will be web and print based to represent ways to interact with and activate the garden and shape a practical toolkit responsive to the seasons
- The research and development of p a co-operative group/community linked to the garden uniting different local communities with the idea that they take ownership of the space, help maintain and also gain from it as a resource
- The development of an experience/series of guided encounters for suggested ways to experience the garden and surrounding area in the form of audio and printed guides

- Down By The Lake a programme of cultural entertainment and environmental learning will be cocurated by the community and delivered by arts producers, Culturapedia, outdoor cinema producers, Eden Arts with Cine North and Picnic Cinema and environmental organisations and societies to include:-
- Culturapedia a micro-theatre programme small scale, intimate artistic performance

FAIRHAVEN HERITAGE LOTTERY PROJECT UPDATE

PUBLIC ITEM

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

Building Works Contract

The construction works have now been progressing for approximately 4 months (including the standard two-week shutdown period over Christmas). The Pagoda building is due to be handed over for the Council and its partners to undertake fit-out works at the end of February 2021. The fit-out works should be completed by the end of March ahead of opening to the public (subject to COVID restrictions). The Watersports Centre is due to be handed over to the Council in May ahead of opening for the summer. The Café programme has been extended to mid-July due to significant additional structural works which were unforeseen during the design process. Additional costs associated with the prolongation will be taken from the project contingency pot.

Landscape Works Contract

The circular pathway has now been completed enabling full pathway access around the entire perimeter of the lake. The first phase of the Japanese Gardens has been completed which included uncovering of all the original stonework around the lake, forming the lagoon and completing the perimeter accessible pathways around the gardens.

A second phase of works is due to be undertaken during March/April 21 which includes edge protection stonework and planting, remediating grass areas and completing the crazy paved pathways within the footprint of the gardens. This second phase of works will also include some trial planting beds. The third phase of the Japanese Gardens will be the completion of the planting, which will be undertaken through the new on-site Gardening team under direction of the Landscape Architect. This is a long-term undertaking as part of the day-to-day responsibilities of the Gardeners which will include trial and error methodology of establishing plants that can survive in the harsh conditions at Fairhaven.

Interpretation

The artwork for all external and internal panels including the heritage timeline has now been finalised and issued to the appointed signage contractors (Links Signs and Graphics). These items are due to be installed throughout March ahead of the Pagoda building opening in April.

We have also appointed an Audio-Visual contractor who will be installing specialist lighting within the Pagoda, alongside monitor installation, installation of the 'Guida' rotating kiosk and specialist seasonal sound programme.

The remaining procurement activities within the Interpretation include the programming and development of the Fairhaven app. The specification of the app and how this interacts with the specialist equipment is being developed ahead of tender release in March.

Activity and Events Programme

Due to the continuing COVID 19 restrictions, there has been no further activity and events at Fairhaven. The Activity and Development Officer has produced a revised plan for the final year of NLHF funded activity and events at Fairhaven. Due to restrictions there is forecasted to be an underspend of the Activity and Events budget. The NLHF have agreed in principle to extend the funded Activity and Events programme to the end of summer 2022.

 Officer and will be shared with Lowther Trust before any tender is advertised, as the Contract once
 awarded, will be between the artist/sculptor and Lowther Trust
- Once the tender documents have been finalised, it is planned to advertise a two-phase tender based on the donations received. The first phase to include consultation, design and the creation of a small replica statue agreed by all stakeholders to be used for fundraising and the second phase to cover the creation of the main statue, delivery, and installation
- As part of the first phase works, the successful artist/sculptor will then assist in the submission of the planning application, once the details of the statue and the infrastructure are agreed
- Phase two of the tender will be awarded to the incumbent artist/sculptor once the funding is secured
- The Head of Cultural Services and Cllr Fazackerley attend the monthly meeting of Lowther Trust, with the Bobby Ball statue project being a regular Agenda item.

Further updates will be provided periodically to future meetings of the Tourism and Leisure Committee.
